5. Once your family has been accepted into membership and we verify that your requested classes are available, you will receive a welcome email with instructions to pay your \$75 registration fee. Included in that email will be a link to purchase and process your background check.

A. General Behavior

In order to maximize the benefit of co-op, we ask all co-op members - parents, teachers, students and children follow these guidelines:

- 1. We expect members to be exemplary in their attitude of cooperation and respect for others.
- 2. Respect and be good stewards of White Bluff Methodist Church and it's members.
 - Please stay in the designated areas being used by the co-op only. We do not wish to interfere with the church staff or the business of the church.
 - Do not play with the church instruments or equipment.
 - Bathrooms are to be maintained and kept orderly. Proper bathroom etiquette must be observed. If you see a problem, please pitch in and clean it up.
 - Teachers, please be careful to use only classroom supplies belonging to the co-op. Also, please leave your classroom as it was when you arrived. If you bring co-op supplies into the classroom, please remove them when you leave.
 - Any purposeful acts of vandalism will be dealt with swiftly and severely!

3. If, for any reason, a student of any age, is not enrolled in a class while on the premises, he/she must either be with a parent or helping in a younger class. We believe that strictly enforcing this rule will help us to avoid any potential problems.

4. The co-op contact list is for the sole use of its participants. It is not to be shared with anyone outside of our group.

5. Bullying, harassment, or intimidation of any kind will not be tolerated.

6. Students are not allowed to have pocket knives or lighters.

7. No guns or weapons of any kind are permitted on the premises.

8. No drugs, alcohol, or illegal substances are permitted on the premises. There will be zero tolerance for possession and/or solicitation of any of these substances.

9. Please see the comprehensive cell phone policy.

10. Students should not engage in traditional dating behavior at co-op. We want all students to feel comfortable and to treat each other as friends.

B. Classroom Behavior

In order to maximize the benefit of classes for all students, we ask that you instruct your child in the following classroom behavior:

- 1. Participate.
- 2. Obey your teacher.
- 3. Listen carefully to directions.

4. Raise your hand if you want to say something.

5. Do not talk when someone else is talking, especially the teacher.

- 6. Stay seated in your chair unless your teacher requests you to do otherwise.
- 7. Be respectful to all adults and fellow students.

8. All adults are referred to as Mr. or Mrs.

9. Use your best manners at all times, (I.e. yes ma'am, no thank you, please, etc.)

10. We expect all students to be exemplary in their attitude of cooperation.

11. Students and parents must be in their assigned classes in a timely manner.

12. No gum will be allowed in the facility.

13. Student cell phones are to be turned off and not used during class. See the comprehensive cell phone policy in section E.

C. Discipline Policy

Co-op students should "read and heed" all co-op Rules and Guidelines. We do not anticipate having any behavior problems with our students. However, general discipline policies must be set. **Please understand that blatant defiance will not be tolerated at any level.**

If behavioral issues arise, the following protocol will be used:

1. The teacher will address the problem with the student.

2. If any student causes serious class disruption, he/she will be removed from class that day and taken immediately to the parent. If the parent is not available, the child will be placed with a leadership staff member until the parent arrives.

3. The Leadership Team will evaluate and determine disciplinary actions on a case by case basis to include restrictions, suspensions, and expulsion in instances of persistent behavior problems over a period of time or major rule violations.

D. Attendance

It is our prayer that we will all have a servant attitude and will view the co-op as an opportunity to minister to one another. Parents and students must take their commitment to the co-op seriously. Consistent attendance is vital for the co-op to run efficiently. There is a great loss in classroom instruction with each absence. It is not only hard on the student, but is difficult for the teacher, especially for those working on an on-going project or for classes that build in skills.

1. Once commitment is made to the co-op, barring a family emergency or illness, we will be counting on your attendance each Friday.

2. If you (the parent) are unable to attend and fulfill your required volunteer hours, you must contact your Area Coordinator and co-teacher to inform them of your absence. The Area Coordinator will secure a sub for your class.

3. When the parent is absent, we reserve the right to ask you to keep your preschool-aged and elementary school-aged children home with you. Middle and High school students may still attend classes only if a participating parent is willing to take responsibility for your students.

4. Punctuality is vital to the success of the co-op. It is very disruptive to and inconsiderate of the class if a student or teacher is consistently late. Please be considerate of this concern.

E. Cell Phone/Personal Technology

1. Students are not allowed to use their phones during the co-op day. All cell phones must be turned off and placed in the student's backpack before entering co-op and must remain off and in the student's backpack during the entire co-op day, including lunch.

2. If a student needs to call his parents during co-op hours, he may do so only with permission from a teacher.

3. Cell phones that are used during the co-op day without permission will be collected and given to a leadership team member until the end of the co-op day.

4. Using any personal technology in a bathroom will be deemed a major rule violation. Using electronic devices to access inappropriate materials in the co-op building will be deemed a major rule violation.

Classroom Exception: Teachers have the permission of the Leadership Team to create and administer unique technology policies for the classroom in which they are teaching only. Students are responsible for turning off their phones and putting them away upon completion of that class.

F. Dress Code

The purpose of a dress code is to honor God and to promote an orderly learning environment. Our co-op will maintain a high standard of Christian conduct. We ask that each parent and student try their best to exemplify Christ in their lives by wearing clothing that would honor Him.

- 1. Participants may **NOT** wear the following:
 - Tank tops
 - Halter tops
 - Tops with spaghetti straps
 - Netted or see through clothing
 - Midriffs or tops showing stomach
 - Shorts/skirts/slits shorter than fingertip length
 - Shirts displaying distasteful pictures or sayings, advertising tobacco, alcohol or controlled substances
 - Pants that are low cut, too tight, or that hang low off of the hips
- 2. Caps and hats are permissible with the discretion of the teacher.
- 3. Shorts should be at least fingertip length with arms fully extended at side.
- 4. The dress code must be maintained by everyone registered at or visiting our co-op.

5. Any participant in violation of the dress code will receive a warning by a member of the Leadership team. When a student is warned of a violation, their parent will be notified as well. The Leadership Team reserves the right to ask the student to wear an oversized t-shirt to cover their body appropriately or ask the student to leave co-op and return in clothing that aligns with the co-op dress code.

G. Homework Policy

Elementary Students (1st-6th grade):

Elementary students will be given a homework notebook at the beginning of each session. We will give you a few guidelines on how to use the homework, but want you to remember that you know your child better than anyone. Feel free to assign the amount of homework you feel is challenging for your child. The homework notebook will be "stamped" each week to record the amount of homework and extra credit that the student completes. While homework is not mandatory at the elementary age, it is highly encouraged and will be rewarded at the end of each session.

Middle and High School Students (6th-12th grade):

These students **will be expected** to work very hard and diligently to complete all assignments and to learn the material. The class material will build upon itself in skill and knowledge level. It would be very easy to get behind if the assignments were not learned systematically. **Please read the class descriptions and expectations before committing to any class.**

"And whatever you do, do it heartily as to the Lord and not to men, knowing that from the Lord you will receive the reward of the inheritance, for you serve the Lord Christ. "

Colossians 3:23-24

Kingdom Builders Homeschool Co-op has set a high, godly standard for our students in that they are to strive for excellence in all of their classes and take them seriously (as to the Lord). We will expect students to be prepared to participate in class and to turn in all assignments and tests on time. The students will need to keep up with their assignments even during the weeks when there are no co-op classes. A detailed syllabus will be given on the first day of class.

If the teacher feels the student is not keeping up with assignments, he/she will notify the Leadership Team and a parent. It will then be the parent's responsibility to follow-up with their student. We realize that there are unavoidable circumstances that can cause missed assignments. Out of respect for our teacher's time and efforts, we ask for prompt, clear communication for adjustments to be made. If this becomes a recurrent, unresolved problem, the student and parent will be asked to meet with a leadership member and may be asked to withdraw from the class.

Academic Probation: If a student misses two assignments without parental communication with the teacher, leadership will speak with the parent and student. Leadership will evaluate the circumstances for the missed assignments. If there are no extenuating circumstances, the student will be placed on academic probation. A subsequent missed assignment will result in the student being removed from the class without fee refund. The student will be required to stay with their parent (in the same room) for the entire class time the remainder of the year.

Academic Honesty: Our teachers are familiar with their student's work and can identify inconsistencies therein. If an assignment appears to have been written with AI, copied or plagiarized, the student will receive a 0 on the assignment. The parent will be contacted and will be required to sign off on subsequent assignments to indicate they have reviewed the work prior to the student turning it in. Further incidents will be handled on a case-by-case basis, up to removal from class with no fees refunded. Students who have been removed from a class must remain with their parent for the entire class period.

Note: Our co-op is not a school and does not function as a school. We are here to help the parent fulfill what God has called them to do. Please consider that the teacher/facilitator is to be viewed as a help to the parent. Our courses are structured to give parents options to fulfill some of the graduation requirements recommended by the state graduation guidelines, if they so choose. However, as the parent, it is your responsibility to determine if the requirements for graduation have been fulfilled.

H. Supplies

1. All students will need to bring a backpack or tote bag to carry supplies.

2. Clearly label all items, especially backpacks, lunch boxes and supplies.

3. The Co-op will provide pencils, crayons, markers, scissors and glue for preschool and elementary students. These students will still need a backpack or tote bag for notebooks and projects.

4. Check the child's bag for notes sent home from your child's teachers each week.

5. Lost and Found items will be placed in a box on the information table each week. Items will be held for one month before being donated to charity, so please check the lost and found box regularly.

I. Illness

1. Please do not bring any child (**nursery thru 12th grade**) who has had a fever, vomiting, or diarrhea <u>within</u> <u>the last 24 hours.</u> (If in doubt, please don't.)

2. If your nursery or preschool child has a cloudy, runny nose or a consistent cough, please do not bring him/her to co-op. It is not worth the chance of infecting other children.

3. If your child requires any medication, please keep it with you and administer as needed.

4. Notify teachers if your child has any allergies, especially in a class where food may be served.

J. Lunch Time

1. Lunch time will be included in the schedule. All students should bring lunch to co-op each week. Please be sure to finish lunch quickly to arrive at your next class on time.

2. Parents will be assigned to monitor lunchtime for all lunch periods.

3. Nursery and preschool children may not bring peanut products, tree nut products, or red beverages. If possible, drinks should be light or clear in color.

4. A nut-free table is provided for students with allergies.

5. Please be sure to clean up all food and paper fragments after lunch.

K. Nursery and Preschool

1. Nursery children may only be in the nursery during actual hours parents are involved in the co-op or teaching. (Five hours would make it a long day for both babies and workers.)

2. Nursing mothers, please use modesty and discretion around other children.

3. Babies, 4 months and older, must be left in the nursery. It is disruptive to the class and potentially dangerous for the baby otherwise.

4. If you have a child with special needs, please notify Leadership and his/her teachers.

5. If you ask anyone to pick up your child (I.e. husband, grandparent, friend, etc.), please notify the nursery/preschool teacher and also pin a note on your child's diaper bag or backpack so all teachers will be aware of it. (Sometimes the teacher in that class may be different than at the beginning of the day.)

- 6. At least two adult teachers should be with the children at all times.
- 7. Leave the door open whenever there is only one teacher in the room.

We have scheduled two teachers in every class, but we also recognize that there are times when one teacher may need to leave the room to take children to the bathroom, get supplies, etc. Therefore, when this occurs, please leave the door open.

8. Prop the door to the bathroom open when taking younger children to the bathroom.

When using the main restroom, please check first to make sure it is clear of other adults and older students before allowing the children to go in. We realize that younger children may need help with hand washing etc,. so please prop the door open with one of the provided doorstops when interacting with children in the bathroom.

9. No peanuts or tree nuts are allowed in the preschool area at all.

L. Visitors

- 1. All visits to co-op should be scheduled with a member of the Leadership Team prior to visiting Co-op.
- 2. Visiting children must be school age (not nursery or preschool.)
- 3. Guests should be aware that there may not be supplies for them to participate in certain classes.
- 4. All visitors should check in with a member of the Leadership Team.

M. Announcements

Announcements and other important information will be sent through e-mail. It is imperative that each family check your email throughout the week and Thursday evening to stay abreast of announcements. If you do not have access to a computer, please arrange for another co-op family, etc. to make you a copy or to inform you of information as it arises.

In addition to emails, members will receive periodic text message announcements and reminders. These messages do not take the place of e-mail as our primary mode of communication.

N. Miscellaneous

If you leave an item at the church, it will be placed in the co-op lost and found until the next scheduled co-op day. The Leadership Team does not have the flexibility of accessing the church at any time because of the church's alarm system.

All unclaimed items will be donated to charity periodically.

Kingdom Builders Homeschool Co-op Statement of Faith

We believe the Bible, both the Old and New Testaments, to be the inspired, inerrant, infallible, divinely preserved Word of God which constitutes completed and final revelation, and to be the sole and final authority for faith and practice. (II Timothy 3:16-17, II Peter 1:21, Psalm 119:89, Psalm 12:6-7)

We believe there is one living and true God —an infinite, intelligent Spirit, perfect in all His attributes, and eternally existing in three persons: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. (Deuteronomy 6:4; John 1:1-13; Matthew 3:16-17; Il Corinthians 13:14; Revelation 1:8)

We believe in the deity of our Lord Jesus Christ, His virgin birth, His sinless life, His miracles, His vicarious and atoning death through His shed blood on the cross, His bodily resurrection from the dead, His ascension into Heaven, and His imminent bodily return in power and glory. (John 1:1, 14; Luke 1:31-35; Philippians 26-8; I Corinthians 151-8; 15:21; I Peter 2:24; Ephesians 1:7; Hebrews 9:12; Acts 1:9-11; I Thessalonians 4:13-18)

We believe that man was created in the image of God but fell into sin through the disobedience of Adam and is, therefore, lost, unable to justify himself before God. (Genesis 1:26, 27; 2:16,17; 3:6; Romans 3:10, 23)

We believe that salvation is the free gift of God given to the sinner by grace and received by personal faith in Jesus Christ alone, as Savior and Lord, whose substitutionary death on the cross paid the penalty for man's sin. This free gift of salvation is not received by any personal works whatsoever. (Ephesians 2:8-9; Titus 3:5; John 1:12; 5:24; Romans 5:15; 6:23; 10:9-13; Acts 16:31)

We believe that the ministry of the Holy Spirit is to convict and regenerate mankind, and to indwell, guide, instruct, and empower the believer for godly living and service. (John 16:7-14; Titus 3:5; I Corinthians 6:19; 12:13; Romans 8:14; Ephesians 5:18)

We believe in the resurrection of both the saved and the lost; that they are saved unto the resurrection of life and they that are lost unto the resurrection of damnation. (John 5:28-29; I Thessalonians 4:16; Revelation 20:4-5; 20: 12-15)

We believe that as Christians we are called to live a life of holiness, being pure of heart, mind, word and deed, reserving sexual activity for the sanctity of marriage, the Biblical interpretation of marriage being a lifelong commitment before God between a man and a woman. (1 Thessalonians 4:3-5, Hebrews 13:4, Matthew 19:4-5)

Our association has a Christian emphasis, as evidenced by the Statement of Faith. It is important for all members to realize Kingdom Builders is not a school; it exists only as a cooperative association of parents committed to protect and educate our children. When you register for classes in our group, all of our activities and meetings will be conducted with a New Testament Christian emphasis. All classes will be taught from a Biblical standpoint. Science will be taught from a creationist (young earth) standpoint. With your signature, you acknowledge that you are in agreement with our Statement of Faith and will adhere to the membership guidelines.

How much will I need to work?

On average, co-op is a 4-6 hour, weekly commitment for everyone. Everyone needs to be available the whole time their children are participating in co-op. We will make every effort to provide teachers time during the co-op day for planning.

Where will I work?

It takes many people to keep the co-op running smoothly. From teachers to nursery and clean-up, every part is essential. Your assignments will be based as much as possible on the preferences indicated on your Teaching Commitment Survey.

What will be required of me?

At the beginning of the day, nursery, preschool, and kindergarten teachers need to be in their rooms by 9:15. Those assigned to assist elementary students during opening need to be in the fellowship hall by 9:20. All others need to be in their assigned place at least 5 minutes before class begins. Teachers need to be ready to begin class activities at the start of the class. Coordination with co-teachers should be done in advance as much as possible. Those teaching the last hour of the day will need to allow time to clean up their room. Those teaching in nursery, preschool, kindergarten and elementary classes will need to wait in the room until all children are picked up.

What is co-teaching?

Co-teaching is ideal for our group because it spreads the workload, helps to avoid burnout, and is just a lot more fun than teaching alone. This type of teaching can work many different ways. Some teams prefer to plan together and split preparation responsibilities each week or to alternate weeks of responsibility. The most effective method is the one that works best for the team. It is important to remember that each team member is equally responsible for preparation and weekly participation. In a few cases, one of the teachers may have taught the class before and already have prepared the syllabus. It is very important for the team to not fall into the assumption that this is a main teacher and helper situation, even if it appears so initially. The roles of a background co-teacher are equally important. They will be expected to participate in the class, make copies, or complete grading and teach the class as needed.

Can I leave the campus during co-op?

If there is a time during the day when you are not scheduled or needed for any classes, you may leave the campus. A sign-out sheet will be on the table, so parents can be reached in the case of an emergency. Please note, the nursery is provided only during the time the parent is teaching. If you leave campus, you must take your nursery aged child with you.

What if I go out of town or have an appointment?

Obviously, the co-op runs most smoothly when everyone is present. We ask that you not schedule other activities or appointments during the co-op day whenever possible. However, since some things cannot be avoided, the following policy should be followed: 1)coordinate with other teachers so they are aware of your absence and 2)contact the appropriate person on the leadership team about your absence so that arrangements can be made to fill your place.

What if someone in my family is sick?

In cases of sickness, send an e-mail or text to the leader of your area so they can arrange a sub. <u>A follow-up call</u> <u>is required if a reply confirming receipt of the e-mail or text is not received in a timely manner.</u> In addition, please contact your co-teacher to allow them to plan for your absence.

What is the Sub List?

On the occasion that a teacher is absent due to sickness or other commitments, a sub is required. All members will be assigned specific dates throughout the year that they must stay on campus and be available on those dates to sub when they are not teaching. The names of those who are on the sub list will be sent out each week. On average, you will serve as a substitute teacher once a month. If you are unable to fulfill your scheduled sub list day, please switch days with someone who serves the same time of day as you and let your area leader know of the switch.

It is our prayer that we all will have a servant attitude and view the co-op as an opportunity to help one another.

Foreign Language

HS Spanish I : grades 9-12

MS IEW: Structure and Style for Students - grades 6-8

Curriculum: IEW: Structure and Style for Students (Year 1, Level B)

Curriculum/Supply Cost: \$35.00 (binder and student packet)

**You do not have to buy the videos, although they would be an excellent supplement (we will cover in class everything that is taught in the videos).

Class Fee: \$35

In this Middle School writing class, students will learn IEW's nine structural units of writing, which begin simply and increase in complexity as the school year progresses. Students will create keyword outlines from a source text, generate creative stories, and develop essays. Stylistic techniques such as dress-ups and sentence openers will be practiced throughout the course. Students will complete weekly writing assignments and will measure their writing against a checklist.

MS Literature with a Twist 2- grades 7-8

Teacher- Margie Robichaux and Stacy Fordham Curriculum- The Wingfeather Saga (4 books) Curriculum/Supply Cost: \$23

Class Fee: \$35

This literature class is based on a book series to make reading fun and explore the basics of middle school topics. This includes, but not limited to, class debates, some math, writing, presentations, detective research, and drama/art. **Time Commitment:** 3-4 hours per week

MS Chronicles of Narnia- grades 6-8

Teachers: Theresa Wagoner and Melissa Gainey Curriculum: all 7 books of Narnia series Curriculum/Supply Cost: \$50

Class Fee: \$35

Students will read the entire Narnia series, completing a book approximately every four weeks. In-class discussions and activities will help reinforce vocabulary, literary devices, life application, and Biblical truths discovered in the series. This study is appropriate for students who have read all or some of the Narnia series and for students who have never experienced Narnia at all. Homework will be mainly reading about four chapters per week and then completing vocabulary and worksheet activities.

MS Literature - grades 6-8

Curriculum- The Wanderer by Sharon Creech, The People of Sparks by Jeanne DePrau, A Christmas Carol by Charles Dickens, Pictures of Hollis Woods by Patrica Reilly Giff, Sadako and the Thousand Paper Cranes by Eleanor Coeer, Ruby Holler by Sharon Creech, Treasure Island by Robert Louis Stevenson **Curriculum/Supply Cost:** \$50

Class Fee: \$35

Description- This class is designed to help students to love reading a good book and become great writers along the way. There will be literary analysis for each book and essays or projects that coincide with the novels. Students should be able to read novels at a middle school level and write an essay that maintains the topic.

Time Commitment: approx. 30-45 minutes per day, depending on speed of reader

HS American Literature – grades 9-12

Curriculum: no textbook- assigned book list

Curriculum/Supply Cost: TBD

Class Fee: \$35

The student will read classic works of American literature. This literature includes novels, short stories, essays, autobiographies, memoirs, and poetry. The student will have several writing assignments that will take different forms. At the end of this class students will have gained a better reading comprehension and be able to demonstrate competence in essay organization, style, and mechanics. This class will be integrated with the American History course but can be taken as a standalone.

Class Fee: \$35

This Freshman/Sophomore level class will have a heavy emphasis on reading. Students will read 6 novels, one Shakespeare play, various short stories, and poetry. They will respond to literature through written analysis (comprehension questions, formal essays) and class discussion. The study of vocabulary will be incorporated using Wordly Wise Book 9. Weekly quizzes will be given to assess understanding.

Time Commitment: 5 hours per week

HS World Literature - grades 9-12 Teacher: Melissa Pearce Curriculum: TBD Curriculum/Supply Cost: TBD

Class Fee: \$35 per year

Prerequisite: none

This class will serve as an introduction to World Literature. Completion of this course can be used as one literature and composition credit towards a high school transcript. With this class, students will learn to annotate, analyze, and appreciate literature as well as develop Christian

discernment skills. Students should be prepared for a minimum of one hour of outside classroom work per day. Grades will be calculated through writing assignments, oral presentations, essays, and classroom participation. **Time Commitment:** 4-5 hours per week

HS British Literature- grades 10-12

Teacher: Ronda Maughan Curriculum: TBD Curriculum/Supply Cost: TBD Class Fee: \$35 per year Prerequisite: none

British Literature is a literature and composition course. Focus works, including novels, short stories, poems, and drama, have been selected for literary quality, and for their place in the historical development of literature. Context readings provide background information about the author, the historical period, and the literary and artistic context of the focus work. Students will gain an understanding of the development of literature and will practice the skills of writing. **Time Commitment:** 4-5 hours per week

Social Studies

MS Civics – grades 6-8 Teachers: Maggie Adkinson Curriculum: Uncle Sam and You Part 1, Part 2 (Notgrass) Curriculum/Supply Cost: \$90 Class Fee: \$35 per year Prerequisite: none Students will learn about citizenship, national symbols, patriotism, the basics of the American economics system, and how our communities, states, and nation work. Time Commitment: 3-4 hours per week

MS US Geography -grades 6-8

Teachers: Kelly Jervis
Curriculum: Notebooks will be prepared for each student. An atlas (US or a world atlas that includes US regions or states) is highly recommended. Internet access.
Curriculum/Supply Cost: \$30
Class Fee: \$35 per year
Prerequisite: none
Learn states, capitals, and other important facts about each state including National Parks as we explore geography terms and various types of maps. Class time will be spent on review and geography games.
Time commitment: 1-2 hours per week

<u>MS World Geography</u> - grades 6-8 Teachers: Theresa Wagoner and Melissa Gainey Curriculum: Notebooks will be prepared for each student, atlas Curriculum/Supply Cost: \$15 Class Fee: \$35 per year Prerequisite: none Using Trail Guide to World Geography we will learn about mapping, climates, culture, animals and more. We will use our atlas to do atlas drills and mapping assignments each week. There will be weekly research topics and occasional projects. Grades will be based on your participation and your homework. There will not be tests in this class. **Time commitment:** 1-2 hours per week

HS World Geography - grades 9-12

Teachers: Esther Ball and Caroline Farrar **Curriculum:** Notgrass *Exploring World Geography* Part 1 and 2 **Curriculum/Supply Cost:** \$40-100 (textbooks)

Class Fee: \$35

Using the Notgrass *Exploring World Geography* curriculum, this high school level class will take a deep dive into physical and cultural geography from a Christian perspective. Each week students will be expected to read the narrative lessons in the text, take notes, and memorize countries, capitals, and geographic features. Weekly quizzes and quarterly tests will be given for assessment. Class time will be used for discussion and review activities and games. Parents can choose to count this as one of the three HS Social Science courses.

Time Commitment: 4-5 hours per week

<u>HS American History</u>– grades 9-12 Teacher: Jenna Torres Curriculum: TBD

Curriculum/Supply Cost: \$50

Class Fee: \$35 per year

Prerequisite: none

This class is a chronological study of the major events in the history of the United States, from the culture of the Native Americans to the early days of the Trump presidency. The course helps students see the past through the corrective lens of a biblical worldview. It leads students to evaluate people, events, and movements from biblical teaching, giving special attention to the rise and growth of secularism. The course also leads students to propose solutions to social problems based on biblical teaching. This class will be integrated with the American Literature course but can be taken as a standalone.

Time commitment: 4 hours per week

HS World History - grades 9-12 Teacher: TBD Textbook: World History 5th Edition Student Text (BJU Press) Curriculum/Supply Cost: \$50 Class Fee: \$35 per year Prerequisite: none

In this class we will trace the major patterns in world history, following them as they point more and more clearly to the triumph of the kingdom of God. As we journey through time, we will cover creation, the earliest post-flood civilizations, the Middle Ages, the Renaissance, the Reformation, the Enlightenment, and civilizations around the world. You will be required to come to class weekly, having read and completed your weekly assignments.

Time Commitment: 4 hours per week

HS Government and Economics- grades 10-12 (1 semester Government, 1 semester Economics)

Teacher: Ronda Maughan Curriculum: TBD Curriculum/Supply Cost: TBD Class Fee: \$35 per year

Prerequisite: none

This class is designed to be half a year of government and half a year of economics. <u>American Government</u>: Our focus will be on the principles and beliefs upon which the United States was founded. Focusing on the U.S. Constitution, the government it established, and the rights and privileges it guarantees. We will also explore federalism, state and local governments, and the opportunities and responsibilities of citizens.

<u>Economics</u>: This course is an introduction to the foundational principles of economics and markets of the world. Students will discuss GDP, supply and demand, banking, government policy, inflation and unemployment, trade, currency, and competition effects on the economy. Students will look at current events and the effects they have on the world economy. **Time Commitment**: 4-5 hours a week

Science

All science classes are lab sciences. Even middle school students complete labs with each unit.

MS Botany – grades 6 - 7

Teachers: Stacy Fordham and Margie Robichaux Textbooks: Apologia Exploring Creation with Botany, Book and Notebooking Journal Curriculum/Supply Cost: \$45-\$65 Class Fee: \$60 per year Prerequisite: none In this course students will learn about the nature of botany and the process of classifying plants. They will study the development of plants from seeds, the reproduction processes in plants, the way plants make their food, and how plants get their water and nutrients and distribute them throughout the body of the plant. Time Commitment: 3 – 4 hours per week

MS Human Anatomy and Physiology - grades 6-8

Teachers: Sue Stephens

Textbook: *Exploring Creation with Human Anatomy and Physiology* Book and Notebooking Journal

Curriculum/Supply Cost: \$45-\$50

Class Fee: \$60 per year

Prerequisite: none

Your middle schooler will love this course! An introduction to human anatomy, it will begin with a quick history lesson on medicine and cells then jump into learning all the major body systems. We will also cover nutrition and health, germs and your immune system, and many other exciting topics while all focusing on the Creator and giver of life. There will be lots of fun hands-on activities, including a few dissections, that will help your student learn to use their brains and hands to better understand the body God has given them and how to honor Him with it.

Time Commitment: 3 – 4 hours per week

MS General Science - grades 7-8

Teachers: Kelly Wiggins Textbooks: Apologia Exploring Creation with General Science 3rd edition Student text with solutions and tests, Exploring Creation with General Science Student Notebook Curriculum/Supply Cost: \$65 for textbook with solutions and test, student notebook \$25 Class Fee: \$70 per year

Prerequisite: Students be prepared to read the material and complete the weekly scheduled assignments. Preview a sample week here -

This course will cover the History of Science, The Scientific Method, Simple Machines, Archaeology, Geology, Paleontology, the Human Body, etc. Extensive reading of each module (chapter) is required and students who are uncomfortable with heavy reading are strongly encouraged to purchase the audio CD that accompanies the book. Students will be required to complete labs in class and at home as well as detailed lab reports. Tests will be assigned and grades will be given. A minimum of four projects will be assigned.

Time commitment: The time commitment for each student will vary (due to reading capabilities) but should be around 4-5 hours per week.

<u>Physical Science</u> - recommended for 9th or 10th graders and mature 8th graders **Teachers:** Amber Fordham and Taylor Milton

Textbooks: Exploring Creation with Physical Science, Fourth Edition Student text Exploring Creation with Physical Science Student Notebook

Prerequisite: Successful completion of Pre-Algebra

Diligent work and good reasoning skills are required. Focus is placed on application of content. This course is designed to be a student's first high school lab science. The course is mainly a survey of chemistry and physics with some content covering earth science. The text discusses such topics as the scientific method, chemical reactions and chemical equations and the periodic table. It also discusses physics topics such as calculating speed and velocity, Newton's laws, gravity and astrophysics. Examples of other included topics are atmosphere, the hydrosphere, weather, and the structure of the earth. The content of the text focuses on physical

science through the lens of God creating and ordering all things. Although many of the experiments will be done as a group, some experiments may need to be completed at home due to time constraints.

Time commitment: Students should expect to spend 3 – 4 hours a week outside of class to complete reading and assignments.

HS Biology – grades 9-10 Teachers: Amy Beckling Textbooks: Apologia *Exploring Creation with Biology* Student text (3rd edition) Curriculum/Supply Cost: \$71 for textbook Class Fee: \$200 per year

Prerequisite: successful completion of Physical Science recommended

This course is a college-prep biology course that provides a detailed introduction to the methods and concepts of general biology. Heavily emphasizing the vocabulary of biology, it provides the student with a strong background in the scientific method, the five-kingdom classification scheme, microscopy, biochemistry, cellular biology, molecular and Mendelian genetics, evolution, dissection, and ecosystems. It also provides a complete survey of the five kingdoms in Creation. Students who take and understand this course will be very well-prepared for a tough university biology course. Most labs are performed at co-op, with a few at home that require more time than co-op allows.

Time commitment: Students enrolled in this course should be prepared to spend 4-5 hours per week on the study of Biology or about an hour a day Monday – Thursday

HS Forensic Science with labs- grades 10-12

Teacher: Mery Hutsell and Karl DeVries

Curriculum: Forensic Science Fundamentals and Investigations- 2nd edition by Anthony J. Bertino

ISBN-13 978-1305077119

Curriculum/Supply Cost: \$45-\$110

Class Fee: \$200 per year

Prerequisite: successful completion of Physical Science

Forensics is the scientific intersection between Chemistry, Biology, Physics, Environmental Science, and Biotechnology. This class will increase the student's knowledge and practical application of current methodologies utilized in the areas of crime scene investigations. Students will use logic as well as critical thinking skills to analyze historical cases as well as modern cold cases. Laboratory activities will allow the students an opportunity to explore fingerprinting, fiber analysis, ballistics, arson, trace evidence analysis, poisons, drugs, blood spatters, and blood samples. These labs will employ many aspects of chemistry including density, inorganic and organic analysis, mixtures, and separations. In order to be successful with the class, the student must participate in all labs and be mature in regard to graphic details of crime sciences.

Time Commitment: Students can expect to spend 3 – 4 hours per week on homework for this class.

HS Chemistry – recommended for grades 10-12

Teachers: Ginger Thompson

Curriculum: Apologia - Exploring Creation with Chemistry 3rd Edition

Curriculum/Supply Cost: \$70 for textbook, \$40 for student notebook

Class Fee: \$200 per year

Prerequisite: *Successful completion of Algebra I* (this class requires the basic math skills taught in Algebra 1), successful completion of Physical Science and Biology.

This course covers fundamental aspects of chemistry such as the classification of matter, atomic structure, spectroscopy, chemical bonding, molecular geometry, physical change, chemical

change, stoichiometry, solutions, ideal gasses, acid/base chemistry, reduction/oxidation reactions, thermochemistry, thermodynamics, kinetics, and chemical equilibrium. Weekly class time will be spent doing experiments and answering questions the students may have from the weekly assignments, questions or problems. Students will be responsible for completing the following items outside of class: Own Your Own Questions, Study Guide, Practice Problems, some lab experiments, and all lab reports. Most labs will be performed at co-op, where all supplies are provided.

Time Commitment: Students can expect to spend 4-6 hours per week on homework for this class.

Other Elective Classes (Full Year)

Logical Thinking - grades 7-9

Teachers: Theresa Wagoner

Curriculum: The Fallacy Detective and The Thinking Toolbox

Curriculum/Supply Cost: \$25-\$50

Class Fee: \$35 per year

Fallacy is an error in logic. We will use the books *Fallacy Detectives* and *The Thinking ToolBox* to learn how to spot common errors in reasoning, when it is dumb to argue, how to analyze opposing viewpoints, use the scientific method and more. We will play games to add fun and help put our critical thinking skills to practice.

Time Commitment: 1-2 hours per week

Homesteading – grades 6-12

Teachers: Stacy Fordham, Margie Robichaux

Curriculum: none

Curriculum/Supply Cost: none

Class Fee: \$60 per year

What would your family do if the power goes out, or you can't get to a store? I think that the last couple of years has provided us with insight to at least have the idea of self-sufficiency on our radar. We aspire to create a class that will teach young minds the importance of homemade products and self-sufficiency. This is a hands-on learning opportunity! If you don't like getting your hands dirty, Homesteading is not for you. Our class will focus on topics such as homemade herbal medicines, spices, condiments, gifts, canning, freezing, dehydration, reusing/recycling of items, gardening, nutritional analysis, animals on the homestead, woodworking, sewing and fermenting.

Time commitment: none

<u>HS Yearbook -</u> grades 9-12

Teacher: Lisa Colvin Curriculum: none Curriculum/Supply Cost: \$10-\$15

Class Fee: \$35 per year

1st and 3rd block: This is a full year course that can be counted as a high school elective credit. 2nd block: This is a half year study that can be counted as half of a high school elective credit. Students MUST have a digital camera in order to take this course. A Digital SLR camera is recommended. Students will need to have a laptop that they can occasionally bring to co-op and some type of editing software. Students will be given a section of the yearbook in which they will be responsible for overseeing. Students must be responsible and complete work on time. Please be familiar with your camera.
